
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## PRESS RELEASE: 120 ADDITIONAL LONG TERM CARE HOMES NOW PART OF THE MIX FOR NEW INGLEWOOD CARE CENTRE



West Vancouver, B.C., March 22, 2022: With the inventory of long term care housing for seniors on the decline in West Vancouver, Baptist Housing has decided to reconfigure the space in one of the new buildings proposed for the new Inglewood Care Centre, to fully accommodate 120 long term care (LTC) suites.

Last year's closure of 75 West Van Care Centre beds and 205 Capilano Care Centre beds leaves Inglewood as the last government funded long term care community in West Vancouver. Under an updated proposal expected to be considered by the District of West Vancouver in coming weeks, the current 230 long term care suites at the outdated Inglewood residence will eventually expand to 360 in total.

#### Phase One (unchanged)

- 230 new LTC suites will be built in the first two new buildings. These are for the residents who currently live in the outdated Inglewood Care Centre to be replaced. These 230 homes are funded by Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH).
- 10 new private pay LTC suites will be also added in the first two buildings.

#### Phase Two (updated plan)

- 120 additional LTC suites will be built in the third building of the project as Phase
  Two begins. In the original plan, the third building was to have been a mix of
  housing types but will now have long term care suites exclusively.
- These rooms will be built to Vancouver Coastal Health's latest design standards, and they offer the restoration of much needed capacity in the District.
- A fourth building will continue to offer 48 affordable housing units for seniors and 107 for team members/workforce in partnership with.
- The fifth building offers 200 independent living suites on a rental basis.

**Subject:** Hydro infrastructure - Bay Street and Royal, Horseshoe Bay

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Dear Mayor Booth and Council,

It was with great disappointment that I read the following in the February 17th district update:

There had been an expectation that, as part of the first phase of streetscape on Royal Avenue between Bruce Street and Bay Street, the utility lines on Royal Avenue would be moved underground. Owing to the extensive work associated with undergrounding the utility, including works that were not previously part of the project scope and budget, it is no longer feasible to pursue undergrounding for the foreseeable future.

The rats-nest of power lines in Horseshoe Bay looks like something from a bygone era - not the sort of view one would expect to discover when arriving at the gateway to our marine highway in one of the most picturesque settings in the world.

For three years the Horseshoe Bay community has been lead to believe that the eyesore on lower Royal Ave. and Bay Street would vanish during the streetscape process. This was further confirmed through discussions I had with Engineering in 2018/2019 during the first sidewalk restoration, before the District stopped work for several months.

Could the District please clarify what work was not previously included as part of the District's scope and budget? The underground infrastructure was laid beneath lower Royal during Phase 1 of the Streetscape Project and the District is actively digging up the park and ultimately the sidewalks along Bay St. It seems unfathomable that the sidewalks along Bay Street won't be completed at some point during this year-long park upgrade, so the natural presumption would be that the power-line infrastructure would be buried at this time.


What has happened to the funds (\$1.5 million, as I recall) that were collected as part of the Westbank Community Amenity Contribution fund and specifically earmarked for power-line undergrounding? Why can these funds not be used to further this project? What is the state of the BC Hydro application grants that were submitted in 2018/2019? Was progress made with BC Hydro on the design and engineering for the undergrounding? Planning and engineering are not my forte, but it seems logical that these grant funds in conjunction with the \$1.5 million CAC contributions would have allowed this work to be completed in a timely manner and not pushed to an indefinite date in the future.

Horseshoe Bay has long been the most overlooked commercial district in West Vancouver. The community truly appreciates the scope of the work that has been done and continues to be done. However, it cannot be overly emphasized that Horseshoe Bay is also the only commercial area in the District of West Vancouver that still has unsightly above-ground hydro poles where marine birds rest and deposit their meals above diners enjoying take-out on the tables and chairs that have been set up in the bike lane.

It is imperative that the funds that were initially earmarked for undergrounding remain earmarked for Horseshoe Bay and used in a timely manner so that we aren't subjected to further disruptions a few years from now, along with wasted tax dollars when the sidewalks on Bay St. could potentially be dug up a second time to accommodate the inevitable.

I look forward to your thoughts.

#### 7. Affordable Rental Spaces for the Cultural Sector Update

Affordable rental spaces for individual artists and arts groups have been identified as a need for West Vancouver and have been discussed at previous ACAC meetings. SpaceFinder, managed by the BC Alliance for Arts & Culture, has been the most comprehensive, well-managed, and up to date source for Lower Mainland spaces for all arts disciplines. The Alliance has suspended the service due to financial and human resources. Another source is: thisopenspace.com/venues

The District has the Permissive Tax Exemption Bylaw (PTE) for organizations classified as charities, which, in return for tax exemptions, must provide their available spaces to other not for profit groups. The COVID-19 pandemic shut down a number of spaces in the community for periods of time and staff is not sure on the current situation for all organizations receiving PTE's.

Committee discussed ideas on how to make affordable rental spaces available to artists such as the development of a simple database, or a platform similar to VRBO or Airbnb that is self-managed, or how to check the spaces that could be made available by charities that receive tax advantages. The issue is also that West Vancouver has little to no industrial space with empty or usable spaces at low cost. Councillor Lambur offered to check with the British Pacific Properties about possibilities for rental spaces. All members agreed that further discussion about this topic is required.

THAT the discussion regarding Affordable Rental Spaces for the Cultural Sector Update be received for information and that further discussion continue.



- a number of potential projects are listed and District of West Vancouver ("District") staff and select committee members do not believe that a complete plan and green strategy is needed prior to establishing an Environmental Levy
- the proposed Environmental Levy of 1.00% would only raise \$800K which is not sufficient to address climate change issues and protect natural resources
- raising proposed Environmental Levy from 1.00% to 1.50%
- deferred asset maintenance still a concern especially with postponing facilities projects to focus on completing Municipal Hall renovations; discussion of raising proposed Asset Levy from 1.00% to 1.50%

#### Action items:

Committee requested a comparison of 2022 operating taxes in the other municipalities and asked if environmental levies were proposed in any of the municipalities.

Committee members confirmed that as Council members they would propose an Environmental Levy of 1.50% at that evening's Council meeting. It was noted that there would be community support for an increased Environmental Levy, but not necessarily an increased Asset Levy as there was an absence of education on that piece.

Committee asked for more detailed information on the projects postponed in order to provide the \$1.5M in additional funding for the Municipal Hall renovation. Staff indicated that a list of projects would be provided.

District staff discussed the proposal to establish a statutory reserve for the Environmental Levy.

Committee members indicated that it would be helpful to set up a workshop with Council and possibility members of the public regarding environmental priorities for short term and long term environmental goals and the development of an environmental strategy.

Committee members requested that the Finance team present a summarized 2022 Budget PowerPoint for the budget discussion at the Council meeting to be held that evening, and staff indicated that they would provide the requested presentation.

It was Moved and Seconded:

THAT the report regarding 2022 Budget – Public Engagement Update be received for information.

#### 5. Research on Pay Parking Options and Alternatives

C. Nelson (Manager, Procurement) reviewed the report and answered questions from the Committee.

Items discussed:

- Annual parking pass for West Vancouver residents

Due to the complexities of the site which limit the type and location of any public art at the Park, the project proposed by the artists and shortlisted by the Panel cannot proceed. Members agreed that the concept proposed by the artists is not feasible in any format and a new call to artists may be required for the Navvy Jack Point Park. The original Call to Artists/EOI did outline some of the restrictions on the site but did not clearly articulate concerns about sightlines and blocking views. This only became apparent and more clear with an on-site meeting of the Panel and artist team.

- 2. another call for artists be developed with more detailed information on technical and sighting limitations.

Wong commented on the need to provide professional development opportunities to artists on how to create proposals responding to Calls to Artists, Expressions of Interest, etc. A discussion was held regarding the opportunity for arts organizations to offer workshops for emerging artists.

Thank you for your email.

With regard to your first question, my understanding is that the Province's position on electronic meetings has shifted since the publication of that guidance document. On September 29, 2021, amendments to the *Community Charter* and *Local Government Act* took effect which enabled local governments to host regular and special Council meetings and public hearing either in-person, via electronic communication facilities, or in a hybrid format that combined both inperson and electronic participation. In a press release proceeding the enactment of this legislative change, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs noted the value in hosting meetings that include an electronic participation option (<a href="https://news.gov.bc.ca/releases/2021MUNI0023-000898">https://news.gov.bc.ca/releases/2021MUNI0023-000898</a>). I confirm that the amendments to the Council Procedure Bylaw are congruent with *Community Charter* requirements.

Following Council's unanimous adoption of the Procedure Bylaw amendments, Council meetings will take place simultaneously in the Council Chamber and via electronic communication facilities (a hybrid format that allows for both electronic and in-person participation) unless Council otherwise resolves.

With regard to your second question, staff are actively working towards the resumption of in-person meetings. We hope to be back in the Council Chamber by the end of April/early May.

Thank you for bringing your concerns this to the attention of the District, which were forwarded to me for response.

We appreciate your concerns related to the development activities at the property of retaining walls that have been approved under the building permit, including one at the back of the property and one along the front property line.

For reference, if excavation is required within the tree protection area; it is a requirement, under the Tree Bylaw, that a certified arborist is on site monitoring the work to ensure best management practices are followed for the protection of the tree and root system.

As you know, an arborist was not on site during the excavation for the retaining wall at the back of the property and, as a result, there was some damage to the root system. For this incident, staff pursued bylaw enforcement under the Tree Bylaw; required an assessment of the trees/roots by a certified arborist with remediation recommendations; and required that the remedial action be completed to the satisfaction of the District Arborist, to ensure that the trees will survive. This was all completed and inspected back in the summer/fall of 2021

During this incident and in several subsequent inspections by the District Arborist, it was explained to the contractor the requirements for tree protection and procedures for excavation near trees. Staff have been conducting regular site inspections on the protected trees.

With respect to the construction of the retaining wall along the front property line, staff are currently working with the contractor to ensure the protection of the trees on the boulevard. There is no tree permit for the removal of the cedar trees on the boulevard. The approved building plans show that these boulevard trees are to be protected and retained.

Staff have reviewed your requested actions and will look into your concerns further as we develop the Urban Forest Management Plan for the District, which includes a review of construction practices, with respect to tree protection, and whether improvements could be made to current practices. For your reference, there will be a public engagement process in early spring and we welcome your suggestions and feedback.

Re: Non-compliance/Lack of Enforcement of West Vancouver Tree Bylaw Tree Protection Barrier Requirements

The objective of this letter is to request that you investigate and take appropriate enforcement action regarding various West Vancouver Tree Bylaw tree protection barrier violations and prohibited encroachments into tree protection zones during property redevelopment. I am appealing to you as I have already exhausted all administrative avenues without success.

#### Background

I am a long time resident of West Vancouver. My family home, where I grew up and still live, is Over the years, my neighborhood of modest homes on sloping lots and abundant natural vegetation has changed significantly as mature trees are felled and vegetation is stripped to improve views and maximize home size.

The changes you made to the Tree Bylaw in November 2020, reflected widespread community concerns regarding the need to preserve these large mature trees, as well as smaller trees of specific species, and to protect them from damage during property redevelopment. The Tree Bylaw's mandated retention of mature trees and the updates to the tree protection barrier s. 22(1) requirements for such trees were particularly welcome for my block in which only of the properties still have trees of sufficient size to qualify as protected under the bylaw. Of particular interest to me are the Tree Bylaw's protection provisions that could have prevented the damage and subsequent loss of a large fir on my property when an adjacent property was redeveloped to include retaining structures up to 10 feet high to support an above

As the decision makers for the Tree Bylaw and its amendments, you will be concerned that several protected cedar trees at a renot receiving the protection you have afforded them. Three of the protected cedars, located within the right-of-way at the base of this property, have already suffered extensive damage to their root systems within the drip line of one tree and within the protection zone of all three trees due to the construction of a 6 foot high retaining wall supporting a level area at the elevation of solution and the boulevard adjacent to similar root and other construction activity damage if a retaining structure that is currently shown on the approved building permit plan is not prevented from being built.

Bylaw Enforcement staff have responded promptly to various complaints regarding the removal of tree protection barriers around both these groups of protected trees, and have pursued bylaw enforcement for violations of the Tree Bylaw related to the damage inflicted on the retained cedar trees during prohibited excavation within the tree protection zone. However, they have not addressed the ongoing and significant encroachment into the protection zone by the prohibited retaining wall, failure to reinstall the tree protection barriers around these trees and the lack of an Arborist on site during the entire period that protection barriers have been absent.

I am concerned that without your intervention, this practice of approving prohibited encroachments into tree protection zones during the issuance of building permits and the subsequent lack of enforcement by Enforcement staff, not only will endanger other "protected" trees your Tree Bylaw seeks to protect, but is already endangering the "protected" cedar trees on the boulevard adjacent Construction plans that accompany the approved building permit contain a retaining structure similar to that which was constructed adjacent to the right-of-way. The significant damage inflicted on these right-of-way cedar trees has already weakened them and could ultimately kill them. Please do not let the boulevard cedar trees suffer a similar fate.

#### Action Requested

Please promote compliance with the Tree Bylaw and ensure that valued community trees receive the protection you provided them in the Tree Bylaw by:

- Preventing the construction of the retaining wall through the protection zone for the "protected" cedar trees on the boulevard adjacent
- Ordering the removal of the encroaching retaining wall at the base of this property.
- Ensuring that all future plans accompanying approved building permits comply with all "Protection of Trees from Damage" requirements of the Tree Bylaw.
- Providing clear direction to Enforcement staff regarding authority to pursue noncompliance with Tree Bylaw tree protection requirements.

I would also be grateful if you would consider amending the Tree Bylaw to discourage the practice of deliberate damage with the intent to have the tree declared a hazard and achieve its removal. In such circumstances, instead of removal, could you please require the tree be retained as a wildlife tree.
