The accompanying Doug Todd column from the Vancouver Sun is very informative on the issue. Of particular note are sensible quotes ascribed to a Squamish Councillor.

Our mayor, with Council's support, is demonstrating both common sense and moral courage by taking the position which he has done respecting the termination of an oral statement of Indigenous land acknowledgements at the start of DWV Council meetings. If it were up to me, I'd have gotten rid of these divisive statements in their entirety but, then again, that's why he and you are successfully elected local representatives and I'm not. :-)

These land acknowledgements have nothing to do with reconciliation but, rather, are aimed at establishing a moral climate favourable to the extraction of reparations. That's the unvarnished truth of the matter. Also, as Ellis Ross, MLA, and former Haisla chief Councillor, is quoted as saying in the aforementioned SUN article, they are an "empty gesture" and do absolutely nothing to help combat the daily and serious challenges faced by Canada's aboriginal peoples.

I read with disappointment that the Mayor and a majority of West Van council no longer choose to begin meetings with a spoken Indigenous land acknowledgement, as they are a council that "values

time". I also read that members of the Squamish and the Tsleil-Waututh Nations found this decision upsetting and disrespectful. I hope that the actions of the Mayor and his Council will not be seen as a reflection of the West Vancouver community at large.

Interestingly, this reporting led me to another story, about Sierra Lee, a West Vancouver secondary student who decided to research whether the Indigenous land acknowledgements were accomplishing their intended purpose. Feedback from fellow students included that, "A lot of them mentioned that because of land acknowledgements at their school, they were able to recognize the privilege they have as a settler who resides on Indigenous territory," Lee also said there were a few students who noted that prior to participating in land acknowledgements, they didn't know they resided on unceded territories.

#### To Mayor and Council:

I am writing in support of a January 2023 public meeting on the amendments for zoning, OCP and DP for the Clyde and Duchess Avenue project, as required by the BC *Local Government Act*. This project offers a unique missing-middle housing option to our community in a time when 'affordable' housing is in high demand and rental availability is low.

Missing middle housing refers to the types of housing missing in WV, such as rental housing, micro-units, townhouses or coach houses; it also refers to housing that 'misses' certain demographics, such as young professionals, WV employees, post-secondary students, aging seniors, or downsizers.

Location of this project – all new multi-family housing in WV must be located in central, walkable villages. Using a Climate Change planning lens, WV must reduce GHG emissions within our community. It is important to note that West Vancouver personal GHG emissions in transportation, residential buildings and solid waste are 4.8 tonnes per person per year in contrast to 3.1 for Metro Vancouver (page10 footnote, CEE Plan Full Technical Report, 2016). GHG reduction is achieved by the design of this multi-family housing (shared walls lowers GHG emissions), and its location close to shops, services, recreational opportunities and to rapid transit and bike paths. The concept of such a walkable village is to minimize the need for a vehicle, thereby reducing traffic congestion, while at the same time improving resident health from increased exercise.

This project meets the recommendations of the Community Energy and Emissions Plan (CEE Plan) - this Plan was researched and written by WV resident experts, WV staff, WV Councillor, and a team of advisors – it was approved by Council in 2016 and integrated into the current OCP. To date, many of the Plan recommendations have been implemented in WV District – as new projects come to Council, these Climate Change recommendations must be considered.

I write in relation to the property development being proposed for Clyde Avenue just east of Taylor Way. As I understand it, this proposal will entail construction of a six story building, one which when complete is to consist of small, studio-style rental apartments. Currently the property evidently serves as a gravel parking lot, something which generates very little tax revenue for the District coffers.

It seems to me that, if I have the facts right, this development will be a very welcome addition to our community. Apart from whatever tax revenue and community amenity contributions it will produce, it ought to provide much-needed housing for the workers (ie. care facility aides, store clerks, restaurant staff, etc.) which we in West Vancouver are becoming more and more desperate to attract to our community. Given the nature of the proposed building, its location in proximity to public transit and the probable composition of its tenants, this development is unlikely to add much volume to the traffic that increasingly afflicts the North Shore.

I would be greatly surprised if this proposal were to provoke much opposition from any but the most unreasonable antidevelopment zealots among us. I note that, if Council votes to allow this project to proceed to the next stage, a Public Hearing is to be scheduled for January 23rd next. This will provide ample time, notwithstanding the Christmas holiday season, for proponents and opponents, such as they may prove to be, to assemble their respective arguments.

From a broader perspective, as elsewhere in Metro Vancouver, our District government has been for years suffering from a severe case of 'bureaucratic constipation'. It has gone process-mad. In the result, for example, our commercial centres are in obvious decline. OCPs and LAPs have their value but they mustn't become a fixation, to the detriment of sensible and steady progress.

I urge you to vote in favour of having the proposed development move forward to the next stage in as timely a fashion as is reasonable in the circumstances.

It is recognized that is not part of the TWLAP, but the traffic components do affect Taylor Way.

With the additions of the structures on the roof, the current 6 stories plus roof top structures make it very imposing. Please consider a reduction to 4 stories with the rooftop structures.

My greatest concern is the following (Blue print is from the Planning Dept's document and red are my comments to the planning document):

Road Dedication and Northbound Overhead Onramp Pages 39 and 40.

The final road specification along the Taylor Way corridor will require approval of the MOTI.

I have contacted the MOT regarding another development on Taylor Way. They advise me they do not turn down applicant's request for traffic changes if it a development has been approved by a municipality. If DWV approves this development, MOT will approve a left hand turn lane from Clyde to southbound Taylor Way Traffic.

As a condition of the rezoning, the applicant will dedicate 4.5 m (9.17 ft.) of road to the District of West Vancouver along Taylor Way to ensure sufficient space for potential vehicle lane realignment, bike, and pedestrian improvements.

This is a very confusing paragraph and should be written in detail to understand what the applicant intends. It is not possible to see this on the drawings. The applicant states they will dedicate 4.5 m of road to DWV along Taylor Way. What does that mean? The province is responsible for Taylor Way. What would be the potential vehicle lane realignment? Please ask the applicant to be more

specific before this is approved to go to public hearing. Is part of the 4.5 m of road the applicant plans to dedicate already part of the easement belonging to DWV?

Furthermore, as the northbound overhead onramp servicing Park Royal North onto Taylor Way may not be needed in the future<sup>10</sup>,

Under what possible conditions/circumstances could the northbound overhead onramp (shouldn't this be referred to as a northbound exit ramp? Perhaps by confusing the wording allows the applicant to confuse the issue so much, that anything becomes possible for the applicant. One is not aware of the agreement of DWV and Park Royal regarding the Taylor Way exit southbound entrance ramp into Park Royal and the northbound exit ramp onto Taylor Way) not be needed in the future? When Larco applies for rezoning of Park Royal North to be developed into high rises as Larco has commented in the past?

the applicant has agreed to modify the terms of the existing easement agreement affecting the site to allow the 'onramp lands' to be transferred to the District of West Vancouver if the onramp is no longer needed in the future.

Exactly what does this refer to? So is the onramp, the southbound entrance to Park Royal? Where is line on Taylor Way that defines the boundary between DWV lands and Park Royal land. This is very confusing and leads me to believe that the onramp and exit ramp on Taylor Way are on Park Royal property. Does that mean that the outside lane on Taylor Way southbound below Keith is on Park Royal land as that lane of traffic leads onto the ramp?

These statements are very unclear, and must be written concisely and to what the applicant proposes before Council agrees for this proposal to go to Public Hearing.

This would allow future flexibility for potential road improvements along Taylor Way.

What are the potential improvements? Please clarify or otherwise these are just meaningless words.

The planned improvements for Clyde Avenue include dedicated westbound turning lanes (allowing for dedicated lanes to turn either north or south onto Taylor Way), a bike lane on the north side of Clyde Avenue and a vehicle pullout for drop-offs in front of the primary entrance of the apartment building.

It is inconceivable that WV Mayor and Council would approve this permit considering the applicant includes to pursue "dedicated westbound turning lanes (allowing for dedicated lanes to turn either north or south onto Taylor Way).

Currently, traffic exiting Clyde are required to turn right, northbound only. Not surprisingly, many ignore this traffic regulation, often turning left into southbound Taylor Way traffic. As you might visulize, rarely is there space to enter the southbound lane, and a car will sit blocking the northbound lane until some kind driver allows the person who has turned left from Clyde to enter the queue. Some turn left and proceed to cross 3 lanes of traffic, holding up southbound traffic, until they are able to cross the three lanes to enter Park Royal parking lot. I have spent the last few days trying to understand how legally exiting Clyde and entering Taylor Way southbound traffic would affect Taylor Way traffic. The applicant's suggestion would legalize all traffic exiting Clyde Avenue to enter southbound, not just the additional 50 cars that the applicant are planning in their parking places. This includes all deliveries and visitors to Amica West Vancouver,

all of the traffic to the businesses in the area, the Water's Edge residences, and the not yet built Executive on the Park residences.

#### Parking Rate Modification for Park Royal North (CD30)

As a lay reader, I am even more confused by the following.

The southern portion of the development site is currently within "Area 3" of the CD30 zone which, in part, regulates land use and parking for Park Royal North (Figure 8). The proposed zoning amendment would remove the development site from the CD30 which will affect the required parking rate for Park Royal North.

Actual available for Park Royal North is indicated in Figure 9 on the next page. Upon detailed review of the CD30, the parking stalls located within I.R. No. 5. cannot be used within CD30 parking calculation (as those lands are not within the CD30 or within the jurisdiction of the District). Accordingly, to update the parking regulations for Park Royal North, the proposed zoning amendment is slated to update the CD30 parking requirement rate from 5 parking spaces per 92.9 m<sup>2</sup> of gross floor area (excluding pedestrian mall areas) to 3.6 parking spaces per 92.9 m<sup>2</sup> of gross floor area.

The revised parking rate works out to a minimum of 1 parking space for every 25.8 m<sup>2</sup> of gross floor area. As a direct comparison, the Ambleside commercial areas currently require a minimum of 1 parking space for every 37 m<sup>2</sup> of gross floor area.

In effect, Park Royal North still has 1,749 available parking stalls<sup>11</sup> and the development proposal is not taking away any useable parking from Park Royal North

Will the 1,749 available stalls be reduced if development takes place where the parkade is or if Park Royal North Shopping is redeveloped. Again, this is an area I don't understand, but seems that no concession should be given to the applicant.

given that the current development site has never been used for day-to-day parking for Park Royal North. Furthermore, the modified parking rate ensures the correct parking ratio is included with the zoning for the site which effectively limits the allowable floor

area of Park Royal North. Any subsequent increase in proposed floor area for Park Royal North would necessitate a zoning amendment and further consideration by Council.



1. As you know we have a chronic shortage of housing, especially affordable rental, in our community - with amongst the lowest rental vacancy rates in BC.

You personally may not want to rent, but thousands do - including many current residents here in West Van.

We cannot wait for the Ambleside LAP to be done, and then for the Taylor Way LAP.

I would venture to suggest that such a delay would set ANY project on that site back until 2027 - and the next council's term.

2. Proper consultation - and giving the public an opportunity to understand proposals - is a cornerstone of good local governance.

Indeed several of you spoke of the importance of meaningful public consultation during the campaign.

I would respectfully suggest that presenting a 156-page document on Thursday and then throwing it out today - without any public input - would appear inconsistent with that message.

In the October 19 edition of the North Shore, there was an article on page 20 comparing the delivery of new housing rental units per capita on the North Shore. Here are excepts from the article:

Over the past six years in West Van, just 68 rental units have been built, while 1,244 condo and homeowner-occupied units wen up. The majority of those rentals were built in 2021. By dwelling type, West Van is primarily building single detached homes and some apartments.

But in another four years, the district anticipates that 465 to 843 new rental units will be required, as well as 874 to 1,238 new three-plus bedroom units (rental and owner occupied).

In terms of the number of units West Van has delivered, the district comes second-last in all of Metro Vancouver, Sagert said. "They clearly haven't placed much of a focus on delivering rentals, and that comes out in our data. There's really a clear gap there between what their own data has shown that they need versus what's being delivered."


I was shocked to see that West Van is second to last in Metro Vancouver in delivering new rental housing units. This micro unit housing development proposed by Park Royal at 671 Clyde Avenue is an opportunity for the District to get back on track with providing much needed rental housing units. Such an development as this is long overdue to meet the needs of those who cannot afford to buy or rent in one of the many luxury apartment developments that have been built in recent years. It responds to the objectives of the OCP for housing diversity, affordability and energy efficiency along with its location in a walkable community close to public transit.

Usually affordability is arranged by offering rental units at below market prices. In this case, Park Royal is arranging for affordable rental units at market prices by reducing their size, which I find to be an innovative approach to housing affordability. Hopefully this will set a precedent for future developments in West Vancouver.

For those concerned about increased traffic congestion in the area, they should be relieved about the planned 0.25 parking stalls per micro unit and the development's close proximity to public transit, pedestrian and bicycle routes. For those concerned about increased greenhouse gas emissions, they should be relieved by the fact that it is planned to use wood-frame instead of concrete construction of the buildings. Also, I understand that these will be high performance buildings with Energy Step Code 2 with Low Carbon Energy System ("LCES Pathway") or Step Code 4 compliance.

I urge you to accept the staff recommendation that Council give first reading to the proposed bylaws and set a date for a public hearing and a concurrent public meeting.



# 6. Capital Funding Subcommittee Update

- 1. The Discovery Group is leading an arts facility feasibility study to assess philanthropic interest from corporate and private donors. A task group was formed to provide information and introduction to people to be interviewed for this study.
- 2. The Altus Group is looking into different ways of funding a facility through Community Amenity Contributions (CAC), land sales, and public-private partnerships. A draft report is scheduled for November.
- 3. The review of potential federal and provincial grants is being conducted by staff.

All three components will be part of a final report which will provide different funding options for a new arts and culture facility to be presented to Council for consideration in the first quarter next year.

# 7. Arts & Culture Facility Vision and Concept

D. Powers presented an overview of the survey's preliminary results. The online survey was available on the webpage from July 18 to September 16, 2022. During that time, 3,728 people visited the webpage; 2,240 of those people opened additional links for more information; and 1,040 people completed the survey. The survey was available to the public at the Harmony Arts Festival from August 3 to August 7, 2022, and to visitors to the West Vancouver Community Centre from August 29 to September 16, 2022. In total, 1,290 people took the survey, but not every respondent answered all the questions. The survey was composed of three main topics: Participation in arts and culture programming in West Vancouver; what

attracts people to visit an arts and culture centre; and factors that are important for a future new arts and culture centre. Committee members discussed the preliminary results.

Chair introduced S. Craig from Urban Arts Architecture, who presented a preliminary report considering the workshop inputs combined with the survey results and how the vision and concept is evolving. The Committee discussed the ten guiding principles and the draft vision statement, offered inputs to the language used, and recommended that the use of the building should be more detailed in the guiding principles. Committee members to send notes to Staff to be considered in the report that will be presented to the community in the Open House sessions on November 1 and 2, 2022 at the West Vancouver Community Centre.

Craig how the vision and concept for West Vancouver compared to other facilities such as Richmond.

# 5. Meetings with Community Groups - Art Museum Advisory Committee

Patterson, Chair of the Art Museum Advisory Committee (AMAC) to present an overview of the role of the West Vancouver Art Museum (WVAM), relationship to other institutions, and strategic partnerships. The WVAM's exhibitions are by invitation with mostly original exhibitions featuring mid-career or established artists of relevance to West Vancouver. The Art Museum produces publications for all its exhibitions to record its projects and preserve the history of West Vancouver's arts and culture.

F. Patterson outlined the WVAM's partnerships with the West Vancouver Memorial Library, the West Vancouver School District, Kay Meek Arts Centre, and the Squamish Nation (for school kits), among others. West Coast Modern Week expanded to a full week this year with additional partnerships including the West Coast Modern League, Kay Meek Arts Centre, and Polygon Gallery.

The WVAM's biggest challenge is with visibility as it is in a location with fewer passersby requiring more reliance on its programming partnerships, strong marketing and social media.



She advised that the plan is to train staff and implement the Bridge Card in early 2023. This card is very targeted towards a specific group of library patron who have no fixed address, minimal or no ID, etc. It will be offered on a case by case basis only, and not advertised.

While the Director has the power to make new card types without consulting the board, S. Hall asked R. Hinmueller to present on this topic in case of any question or concern, and also to provide a progress report, as this is one named item in the annual business plan. In general, the board was very supportive, but there was curiosity about loss rates, and the staff mentioned they will report back six months after launch.

Dear Friends & Neighbours,

Last week, the Honourable Ahmed Hussen, Minister of Housing and Diversity and Inclusion, announced the launch of the third round of the Rapid Housing Initiative (RHI), as well as the 41 municipalities selected to receive funding under the Cities Stream. This is made possible by the Government of Canada's additional investment of \$1.5 billion through RHI, bringing the program's total to \$4 billion to support the country's most vulnerable. This investment is expected to create at least 4,500 more affordable housing units for Canadians in severe housing need across the country, with 25% of investments going towards women-focused housing projects.

RHI provides funding to facilitate the rapid construction of new housing and the acquisition of existing buildings for the purpose of rehabilitation or conversion to permanent affordable housing units. The \$1.5 billion funding for the third round of RHI will be divided into two streams: (1): Projects Stream and (2): Cities Stream.

A total of \$1 billion will be available under the Projects Stream via an applications-based process. Eligible applicants for this stream include provinces, territories, municipalities, Indigenous governing bodies and organizations, and non-profit organizations. An application portal will be available through Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) beginning on December 12.

The \$500 million under the Cities Stream will be allocated to 41 selected municipalities. The first two rounds of the RHI exceeded expectations and are expected to create more than 10,000 units instead of the 7,500 initially planned. This includes more than 3,300 units to support women and more than 4,200 units to support Indigenous Peoples.

The WV taxpayers of course aren't happy about this and, for the sake of our wallets, remain hopeful that no further Federal and/or Provincial 'public employee only holidays' are announced, aware now of the resulting domino effect on lost productivity (or double overtime pay potential) of the WV municipal employees!

What you did not answer for me though was why the non-unionized employees in the District also enjoy this perk. I am assuming that there are some WV municipal employees who are not unionized e.g. managers and directors like yourself and perhaps others. Non-unionized employees do not fall under these union collective agreements so what is allowing them to also enjoy the perk of being awarded these Federal / Provincial 'public employee only holidays' as paid days off? Surely, there is work that still can be done at one's desk or remotely from one's home office without the support of the unionized employees?

I look forward to your response. Much appreciated.

Your question about designated holiday days for West Vancouver staff has been referred to me for response.

The Canadian federal government announced on September 13, 2022, that September 19, 2022 would be a National Day of Mourning in Canada, to mark the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. It was designated a holiday for the public service of Canada. On September 13, 2022, the BC government confirmed it would support the federal government's announcement and issued a statement advising public sector employers to honour this day as a holiday.

Although the provincial government did not pass legislation to make September 19, 2022 a statutory holiday in BC, the federal OIC which set the day as a National Day of Mourning brought the day within the definition of "holiday" under s.29 of the BC Interpretation Act. The District has collective agreements with its unions which confirm treatment of days off and advised the unions that September 19, 2022 would be treated as a paid day off in line with such clauses, without precedent or prejudice and applicable only to September 19, 2022. This was consistent with other municipalities in the region.

September 30 is the Truth and Reconciliation Day, which the federal government declared as holiday in 2021. Staff have been advised that if the province at some point declares a different day to be the provincial statutory holiday for Truth & Reconciliation, the District will observe one day only. This is consistent with other municipalities in the region.

December 26 and Easter Monday are designated statutory holidays in the collective agreements between the District and the unions which represent staff. This is consistent with other municipalities in the region.

Thank you for your correspondence regarding making West Vancouver beaches accessible to dog owners and their dogs during the winter months.

In the past, the District held extensive public engagements with our residents about the use of the Centennial Seawalk, beaches and parks, and developed policies to reflect their input. At that time, in 2010, after considerable public input, Council made no changes to the Animal Control Bylaw from 13th Street to Dundarave Park. Improvements were made to the Bylaw and to signage to permit on-leash dog walking through Ambleside Park. It is not currently on the Council or staff work plan to make changes to the Animal Control Bylaw.

There are many areas in West Vancouver where dogs are permitted, including quite a few off-leash areas, listed below. We encourage dog owners to visit these areas where dogs are permitted.

- 1. Ballantree Park
- 2. Benbow Park
- 3. Seawalk, north of the fence (19th to 24th Streets only)\*
- 4. Clovelly Walk
- 5. Cypress Falls Park
- 6. Douglas Woodward Park
- 7. Hay Park
- 8. Klahanie Park (trails only)
- 9. Lighthouse Park (trails only)
- 10. Walking trails and fire access roads in the undeveloped lands above the highway (with exceptions)
- 11. McKechnie Park
- 12. Seaview Walk
- 13. Westhill Park
- 14. Whytecliff Park (east of Marine Drive)
