


Kay Meek Arts Centre is West Vancouver's professional performing arts centre.



In the 2020-2021 year, Kay Meek Arts Centre welcomed 3254 attendees at 92 events.



COVID challenges and outcomes

- Many host events were rescheduled for this year.
- 2021-2022 sales have suffered due to Covid; however streaming shows became a possibility and filled the 'artistic void' for the community.
- Community rentals have canceled throughout the season which has affected the bottom line greatly.
- ► Kay Meeks Conservatory program enrollment was down 50% due to apprehension on the behalf of students / families.
- Many host events were rescheduled for the year fulfilling Kay Meeks contractual obligations from the previous year.

Kay Meek Society Strategic outcomes

- Kay Meek's board and staff successfully completed a post pandemic season despite the many hurdles and financial challenges.
- The building's renovations are incredibly well received by patrons and students making way for a fully accessible venue.
- A Kay Meek upcoming strategic plan is on the agenda and is intended to be completed in the new year.
- Kay Meek successfully hired a new ED and maintained all staffing positions despite the financial challenges.
- Kay Meek is continuing to strengthen relationships with all presenting partners, School district #45, current and future sponsors, and donors.
- Staff are in the midst of planning for next years schedule and monitoring the challenges that still currently exist during this challenging year.



KAY MEEK 2021-2022 REVENUES

- \$1,350,661 Annual Operating Revenues (not including capital items)
 - ▶ 26% Presentations
 - ▶ 21% Rental Services
 - ▶ 16% Fundraising, Sponsorships
 - ▶ 37% Government operating grants including District of West Vancouver Service Agreement (12%)







What is HRA? Hollyburn Ridge Association

- We are a member-based association supporting a forward-thinking Heritage Community.
- 108 active cabins, 104 DWV, 4 BC Parks.
- Consistently over 300
 members, 50% of members
 are cabin owners, Almost
 95% of cabins are
 members.
- Some cabins are now 3rd generation families.
- No Power, no services, mainly no road access.



A Bit About the Cabins


- Permits have been issued for all cabins since the 1930's
- The current 10-year Permit requires a safety and liability inspection and remediation process at every renewal
- Cabin Owners are responsible for their own costs.
- Our recommended builders are experienced backcountry and log structure tradesmen.
- Most owners are highly qualified in the needs of backcountry maintenance for snow loads of up to 14' a season.



How Does HRA Keep Cabins Alive!

- Encourages Members to keep cabins in a safe condition and to use best environmental and wildlife cohabitation procedures.
- Facilitates a smooth and timely Inspection Process.
- Publishes biannual Ridge Runner Magazine.
- Provides timely email updates such as notices from DWV.
- Website for both public and member only section.


Cabins Alive!

- Maintain safe trails in the area and advocate for hiking only as walk-in only access for all materials and supplies.

HRA Public Outreach

- Creates brochures on cabins and mountain heritage for public and maintains HRA Kiosk.
- Raises money for heritage projects such as the rebuild of Hollyburn Lodge.
- Annual Notable Cup award to outstanding achievers.

- Supports press on stories to the benefit of the community.
- Volunteer clean-up of cabin area including 2-year effort to clean up site 181, a two-decade old demolition, and a heritage midden site located outside Hollyburn Lodge.


THE BATTLE TO SAVE HOLLYBURN'S HIDDEN GIANTS






